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# Cooking is for the Birds: by Kay Green Losh



It's March, which means Spring is coming---sooner or later! For those who have to wait a while for Spring, I'm including a nice warm chowder. For those who will get Spring sooner, here are a couple of snacks for the patio parties, and a pasta dish for everyone!

#### SLOW-COOKER CORN CHOWDER

- 2 ½ cups milk
- 1 (14 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> oz.) can cream-style corn
- 1 (10 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> oz.) can condensed mushroom soup, undiluted
  - 1 3/4 cups frozen corn
- 1 cup frozen shredded hash brown potatoes
  - 1 cup cooked ham, cubed
  - 2 Tblsps. Butter or margarine
  - 2 tsps. Dried parsley flakes
  - Salt and pepper to taste

In a slow cooker, combine all ingredients. Cover and cook on low for 6 hours. Serves 8.



NOTE: Omit ham to make a great vegetarian soup.

#### **BACON CHEESE DIP**

(makes 7 cups, so great for a crowd!)

- 1 lb. bacon, crisply cooked and crumbled
- 2 (8 oz.) packages shredded Cheddar cheese
  - ½ cup chopped pecans
  - 2 cups mayonnaise
  - 1 onion, chopped

Combine bacon, cheese, pecans, mayo and onions: mix well. Serve with assorted crackers, celery sticks.

#### SPINACH BALLS

2 (10 oz.) packages frozen chopped spinach, cooked and drained



- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 cups herbed stuffing mix
- 1 cup parmesan cheese
- 5 eggs, beaten
- 1 ½ sticks butter, melted

Mix ingredients and form into one-inch balls. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 350 for 20-25 minutes. Serve hot or cold (hot is better!)

### CHICKEN AND ARTICHOKE PASTA

1 pkg. (8 oz.) tricolor pasta ½ yellow onion, finely chopped



1 can (7 ½ oz.) artichokes, coarsely chopped, drained

- 2 plum tomatoes, finely chopped
  - 2 Tblspns. chopped cilantro
    - 2 cloves garlic
  - 1 can (3.8 oz.) sliced black ol-

ives

- 1 pkg (10 oz.) prepared diced cooked chicken
  - 3 Tblspns extra-virgin olive oil
  - 2 Tblspns balsamic vinegar
  - Juice of 1/2 lemon
  - ½ tsp each --salt and pepper

Cook pasta in a large saucepan of water to al dente. Set aside. Meanwhile, combine onion, artichokes, tomatoes, cilantro, garlic and olives in a large mixing bowl. Stir in chicken, set aside. Whisk together olive oil, balsamic vinegar, lemon juice, salt, and pepper in a small bowl; add to pasta and toss.

# Technical Tips and Tricks: by Ralph Fullenwider



Here it is March, the air is starting to warm, buds are starting to form on the trees and wanderlust is starting to stir in our bones.

It has been a cold winter, many Coaches stored had problems with freeze protect heaters and the water system needs a checking out.

Now might be a good time to address the basic water system in the Bird's since it is different from most other RV's. And even then there are different systems and up graded systems as time went on. In this article I would like to talk about the pre Aqua hot Coaches, then get to the later systems in another issue. We need to know how the water flow is directed and where it goes and not be worried about what get's the water to the end runs because a pipe is a pipe is a pipe. But the water wont pressure up or there is a leak? We have all been there at one time or another, and it was by great pains in finding the problem. To accurately trouble shoot a water system, the "flow" must be understood.

#### City water inlet;

This of course is pretty much the same on all coaches, and some coaches have an anti reverse valve and pressure regulator built into the same unit. Others have a separate check valve and separate regulator elsewhere in the line or configuration but the principal is the same.

Shore water flows through the check valve going to the water heater inlet side through another check valve and at the same time, flows to the Sporlan valve, normally closed side and continues on to the sinks, shower, ice maker and toilet. The shore water is blocked going to the pressure side of the pump by another check valve. If the fresh water "fill" switch is on, the shore water will pass through the Sporlan valve to fill the fresh water tank and will pour out through the hose in the top of the tank, making a "P" trap in the hose, on the way to the outside drain under the Coach.


#### Fresh water tank system;

With the Sporlan valve in the closed position, coach water flows from the tank out let to the inlet side of the water pump; this is not a pressurized system at this point, so the fresh water tanks are not pressurized at any time. Once the water pump is turned on, the water flows through the pump to the check valve stated above and then onto the out lets under the rated pressure stated on the pump, and when the faucets are all closed the pimp will pressure up the system and stop running when a sensor built

This is a separate circuit and flows to the sinks and shower via a separate water line.

So let's answer a couple of usual questions about the water system;

- 1. The pressure in the shower is low on shore water; can I run the fresh water pump at the same time for more pressure? Answer, yes. But remember the fresh water pump is getting its water from the storage tank and will need refilling.
- 2. The fresh water pump keeps running even with the faucets off, what causes this? Answer; A. the fresh water tank is empty. B. There is a water leak in the hoses or the Sporlan valve diaphragm has a calcium build up and won't close completely. Another problem source is the check valve is stuck open.
- 3. I can hear the water pump running when I am filling the fresh water tank, what causes this? answer; When the Sporlan valve is opened by switching the fresh water "fill" switch, it causes a pressure drop and sensed



into the pump reaches its rated value. In the older Coaches, the PAR belted pump was 45 PSI at 4 gpm and is a \$450.00 pump. There are rebuild kits available for these pumps. Other pump systems in the coaches vary from 35 to 45 PSI at 2.5 gpm to 65 PSI at 5.7 gpm.

The hot water;

by the sensor on the pump and the pump will run trying to pressure up the system. Be sure to always turn off the water pumps when filling the tank.

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### Internet on the Road for Part Timers: by Rich Ducci

There are air-cards from most cell service providers that are a good option for full time travelers but how can part time travelers get quality internet connections in



parks with no (or poor) WiFi? Need a high speed internet connection while traveling but don't want to pay monthly fees when you are not using it? How would you like the internet in your pocket, to be able to take it with you everywhere you go? Well now you can with a MiFi! The MiFi I am talking about today is from Virgin Mobile. It offers you the same features that other MiFi devices offer, but this one doesn't require a contract, it's a pay as you go type of device. It offers you the freedom to pay when you need it only and you're not stuck in a contract for something that you might not use all of the time.

MiFi is appropriately named as it is your own personal high speed WiFi hotspot for



up to five devices. This Virgin Mobile device is battery powered or connected to your power source using a standard micro USB cord or charger (supplied). No connection to the computer is necessary. It carries a one time purchase price of \$149.95 (occasional WalMart sale price

\$119.95) and works with the Sprint 3G network. Using the MiFi 2200 involves a one-time activation. The process guides you through a couple of steps,

including a few fields for personal information, and picking a Virgin Mobile account password. You then pick a payment method, and activate the modem. The Virgin Mobile network uses Sprint - who actually own Virgin Mobile. The advantage of this is that you'll

have access to a reliable nationwide 3G network.

Connecting to the modem is simple - it




broadcasts a WiFi network name called "Virgin Mobile MiFi 2200" making it easy to locate. Each unit's unique password is printed on the bottom on a label, but you are free to change that using its configuration pages.

Up to five devices can connect to the MiFi at the same time, which makes it ideal for those who have multiple devices such as a computer, Kindle, iPad and smartphone or iPhone. \$10.00 buys 100MB or 10 Days making it ideal for a short or weekend trip while the \$40.00 for 1 month deal gives you unlimited use and is great for longer trips.

I recently used this device while traveling and, in fact, for assembling, editing and distributing the February issue of Bird



the iPhone 4 to make video calls to the family. It worked flawlessly both while stationary in the coach and while traveling. The iPhone 4 hi-resolution camera was directed outward to give someone at home a live narrated video tour of an area we were visiting. As stated above, my use found the Virgin Mobile MiFi speeds to be more that satisfactory. Live streaming of HD video or other heavy uses may cause the performance to be slower than you would like.

Having a portable WiFi available for a smartphone means it can be transported along with the phone for use anywhere without using up data allotments on the phone. This may be the right choice for



you if the area you travel is covered by Sprint. You can check their nationwide

coverage by going to Sprint or Virgin Mobile on the web and viewing their data coverage maps.

Check out the historic restaurants in Golden or dine at "The Fort" and experience the culinary delights of our rich Western cultural and culinary past, where food trends of the 1800's are reintroduced. Jim had driven heavy farm equipment when he was young, but this thing had



## Happy Saint Patrick's Day: Courtesy History.com

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17, his religious feast day and the anniversary of his death in the fifth century. The Irish have observed this day as a religious holiday for over a thousand years. On St. Patrick's Day, which falls during the Christian season of Lent, Irish families would traditionally attend church in the morning

and celebrate in the afternoon. Lenten prohibitions against the consumption of meat were waived and people would dance, drink and feast—on the traditional meal of Irish bacon and cabbage.

The first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland but in the United States. Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched through New York City on March 17, 1762. Along with their music, the parade helped the soldiers reconnect with their Irish roots, as well as fellow Irishmen serving in the English army.

Over the next 35 years, Irish patriotism among American immigrants flourished, prompting the rise of so-called "Irish Aid" societies like the Friendly Sons of Saint Patrick and the Hibernian Society. Each group would hold annual parades featuring bagpipes (which actually first became popular in the Scottish and British armies) and drums.

In 1848, several New York Irish Aid societies decided to unite their parades to form one New York City St. Patrick's Day Parade. Today, that parade is the world 's oldest civilian parade and the largest in the United States, with over 150,000 participants.

Each year, nearly three million people line the 1.5-mile parade route to watch the procession, which takes more than five hours. Boston, <u>Chicago</u>, Philadelphia and Savannah also celebrate the day with parades

involving between 10,000 and 20,000 participants.

#### No Irish Need Apply

Up until the mid-19th century, most Irish immigrants in America were members of the Protestant middle class.



began pouring into America to escape starvation. Despised for their religious beliefs and funny accents by the American Protestant majority, the immigrants had trouble finding even menial jobs. When Irish Americans in the country's cities took to the streets on St. Patrick's Day to celebrate their heritage, newspapers portrayed them in cartoons as drunk, violent monkeys.

However, the Irish soon began to realize that their great numbers endowed them with a political power that had yet to be exploited. They started to organize, and their voting block, known as the "green machine," became an important swing vote for political hopefuls. Suddenly, annual St. Patrick's Day parades became a show of strength for Irish Americans, as well as a must-attend event for a slew

of political candidates. In 1948, President Truman attended New York City 's St. Patrick's Day parade, a proud moment for the many Irish whose ancestors had to fight stereotypes and racial prejudice to find acceptance in America.

#### Wearing of the Green Goes Global

Today, St. Patrick's Day is celebrated by people of all backgrounds in the United States, Canada and Australia. Although North America is home to the largest productions, St. Patrick's Day has been celebrated in other locations far from Ireland, including Japan, Singapore and Russia.

In modern-day Ireland, St. Patrick's Day has traditionally been a religious occasion. In fact, up until the 1970s, Irish laws mandated that pubs be closed on March 17. Beginning in 1995, however, the Irish government began a national campaign to use St. Patrick's Day as an opportunity to drive tourism and showcase Ireland to the rest of the world. Last year, close to one million people took part in Ireland 's St. Patrick's Festival in Dublin, a multi-day celebration featuring parades, concerts, outdoor theater productions and fireworks shows.

#### The Chicago River

Chicago is famous for a somewhat peculiar annual event: dyeing the Chicago River green. The tradition started in 1962, when city pollution-control workers used dyes to trace illegal sewage discharges and realized that the green dye might provide a unique way to celebrate the holiday. That year, they released 100 pounds of green vegetable dye into the river—enough to keep it green for a week!

Today, in order to minimize environmental damage, only 40 pounds of dye are used, making the river green for only several hours. Although Chicago historians claim their city's idea for a river of green was original, some Savannah natives believe the idea originated in their town. They point out that, in 1961, Savannah mayor Tom Woolley had plans for a green river. Due to rough waters on March 17, the experiment failed, and Savannah never attempted to dye its river again.
